FIRST READING: 2 Samuel 7:1-11, 16

A Our first reading is from 2 Samuel, chapter 7, verses 1-11 and 16.

Instead of David building a house (temple) for God, God promises to establish David's house (dynasty) forever. Centuries later, after the Babylonian exile, no king sat on the throne. Even then, however, the people of Israel remembered this promise and continued to hope for a king, the messiah, God's anointed.

The reading begins:

¹Now when the king was settled in his house, and the LORD had given him rest from all his enemies around him, ²the king said to the prophet Nathan, "See now, I am living in a house of cedar, but the ark of God stays in a tent." ³Nathan said to the king, "Go, do all that you have in mind; for the LORD is with you." ⁴But that same night the word of the LORD came to Nathan: ⁵Go and tell my servant David: Thus says the LORD: Are you the one to build me a house to live in? ⁶I have not lived in a house since the day I brought up the people of Israel from Egypt to this day, but I have been moving about in a tent and a tabernacle. ⁷Wherever I have moved about among all the people of Israel, did I ever speak a word with any of the tribal leaders of Israel, whom I commanded to shepherd my people Israel, saying, "Why have you not built me a house of cedar?" ⁸Now therefore thus you shall say to my servant David: Thus says the LORD of hosts: I took you from the pasture, from following the sheep to be prince over my people Israel; ⁹and I have been with you wherever you went, and have cut off all your enemies from before you; and I will make for you a great name, like the name of the great ones of the earth. ¹⁰And I will appoint a place for my people Israel and will plant them, so that they may live in their own place, and be disturbed no more; and evildoers shall afflict them no more, as formerly, ¹¹from the time that I appointed judges over my people Israel; and I will give you rest from all your enemies. Moreover the LORD declares to you that the LORD will make you a house. ¹⁶Your house and your kingdom shall be made sure forever before me; your throne shall be established forever.

⁵¹You have shown strength with your arm and scattered the proud in their conceit,

⁵²casting down the mighty from their thrones and lifting up the lowly.

⁵³You have filled the hungry with good things and sent the rich away empty.

⁵⁴You have come to the aid of your servant Israel, to remember the promise of mercy,

⁵⁵the promise made to our forbears, to Abraham and his children forever.

SECOND READING: Romans 16:25-27

A Our second reading is from Romans, chapter 16, verses 25-27.

Paul closes his letter to the Romans by praising God because, in the proclamation of the gospel of Jesus Christ, God has revealed the promised, divine plan of salvation for all humanity. Paul proclaims this gospel of Christ in order to bring about the obedience of faith among all nations.

The reading begins:

²⁵Now to God who is able to strengthen you according to my gospel and the proclamation of Jesus Christ, according to the revelation of the mystery that was kept secret for long ages ²⁶but is now disclosed, and through the prophetic writings is made known to all the Gentiles, according to the command of the eternal God, to bring about the obedience of faith — ²⁷to the only wise God, through Jesus Christ, to whom be the glory forever! Amen.

* **GOSPEL:** Luke 1:26-38

In this annunciation, Luke makes clear that God comes with good news for ordinary people from little known places. This king will not be born to royalty in a palace, but to common folk in a stall. Here Luke highlights the role of the Spirit, a special emphasis in this gospel.

P The holy gospel according to St. Luke, chapter 1, verses 26-38.

²⁶In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, ²⁷to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. ²⁸And he came to her and said, "Greetings, favored one! The Lord is with you."
²⁹But she was much perplexed by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be.
³⁰The angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. ³¹And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus. ³²He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give to him the throne of his ancestor David. ³³He will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end."
³⁴Mary said to the angel, "How can this be, since I am a virgin?" ³⁵The angel said to her, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be holy; he will be called Son of God. ³⁶And now, your relative Elizabeth in her old age has also conceived a son; and this is the sixth month for her who was said to be barren. ³⁷For nothing will be impossible with God." ³⁸Then Mary said, "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word." Then the angel departed from her.

UPCOMING COMMEMORATIONS

Sunday, December 20, 2020 Katharina von Bora Luther, renewer of the church, died 1525

Born to an impoverished nobleman, Katie eventually took vows as a nun, but around age twenty-four she and several other nuns who were influenced by the writings of Martin Luther left the convent. Six children were born to Katie and Martin.

Saturday, December 26, 2020 Stephen, Deacon and Martyr

Stephen was a deacon and the first martyr of the church. He was one of those seven upon whom the apostles laid hands after they had been chosen to serve widows and others in need. Later, Stephen's preaching angered the temple authorities, and they ordered him to be put to death by stoning.

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SERVICE OVERVIEW: *THOSE WHO HEAR AND DO*

Who is God's family? Where is God's home? In the church we often speak of our home congregation as a family. Many of us grew up thinking of the church building as God's house. But the readings for this day call us to anticipate that Emmanuel might understand kinship and home in different ways. As we approach Christmas, which in our culture is increasingly a celebration of hearth and home more than a public festival, the inclusiveness of God's promise rings out from these readings.

The temple often stood in the imagination of Israel as the "house of God," but in 1 Samuel God expresses reservations before the temple is even built. The promise made to David is not about the building. Instead of the expected places of wealth and power, God chooses to dwell in a *people* instead of a "house of cedar."

So if God is dwelling in a people, which people are included in that promise? Although no one disputes that Jesus is born of the "house of David," Luke's gospel stresses Mary's lowliness instead of her bloodlines, reminding us that Christ became flesh in the most unlikely circumstances. Later in Luke's gospel, when someone mentions his family to Jesus, he says his family includes all "who hear the word of God and do it." In today's gospel we see Mary acting out that definition of family.

THEOLOGICAL REFLECTION:

Throughout Advent we continue the theme that God comes in the past in the history of Israel and the incarnation of Jesus, in the present in the word and sacrament of worship, and in the future at the end of all things. Only in this fourth week do the readings refer to the story of Jesus' birth as an arrival of God among us. Welcome to worship! In baptism, we too are filled with the power of the Holy Spirit so that Christ will dwell in us. At holy communion, we too become houses for God.

Even as we wait for Christmas to dawn, this week we are on the move through time and space. On this fourth Sunday, an angel visits Mary to announce good news of promises made and promises kept. Hearers of today's scripture are reminded that the birth of Jesus is God coming to dwell among us, offering faithfulness and steadfast love for all. For countless generations, God's people have moved, and continue to move, without homes, without safety and security, without birth plans, and against all odds. Yet Jesus comes to dwell not only with teenage Mary, but in each of us, throughout every generation — ancient and modern.

Two weeks ago we heard Isaiah prophesy that the Lord's coming would entail a hefty landscaping project: the mountain and hills would be brought low and the valleys lifted up. This week we find Mary walking on foot, her belly not yet grown large with the miraculous baby inside. The great equalizing everyone thought would be achieved with tractors and dynamite instead arrives into creation by the quiet work of the Holy Spirit and the gracious agency of a faithful young woman who believes. God is come, and by Christ's coming all creation can equally rejoice in the reconciling, saving activity of God.

Mary's joyful confidence can be heard in her revolutionary song of praise and hope that still resonates all around the world. We hear her words of security in God's promise that the lowly will be lifted up and the powerful brought down. It is a promise to cling to today as much as ever. It is after the moment of divine inspiration that the difficult and uncharted path begins, and God's blessing goes with us the entire way no matter the perceived difficulty. This is a significant moment in Mary's life. The significant moments in our own lives, like the special celebrations we share at Christmas, are only passing experiences in God's long work of blessing.

Mary proclaims, "Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed" and God's "mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation." What blessings and mercy are being passed from generation to generation in our community? What trauma and judgment? Is God's blessing something you think of when remembering previous generations? How so? What about God's mercy do you hope your descendants will see when they look back on your life and community? What story are you telling people younger than you about God's goodness?

KID STUDY:

Some people put a star at the top of their tree. That's a good choice. After all, a special star played a very important part in the story of Christmas. Some people like to put an angel at the top of their tree. That's a good choice too, because angels also played a very important role in the Christmas story. Angels are messengers from God. An angel named Gabriel was sent by God to deliver a message to a young girl named Mary who was engaged to be married to a man named Joseph. Gabriel told Mary that she would have a baby who will be called the Son of God. God could have chosen anyone to give birth to Jesus, but he chose Mary. She wasn't a powerful or important person, but she was important to God. God still chooses unimportant people to perform important tasks. He has given you and me the task of sharing the good news of Jesus and his love to the whole world. Can you imagine a more important task? This year, as we celebrate the birth of Jesus, let us, like Mary, answer God's call. "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word."

INDIVIDUAL REFLECTION:

St. Bernard declared there are here three miracles: that God and humankind should be joined in this Child; that a mother should remain a virgin; and that Mary should have such faith as to believe that this mystery would be accomplished in her. The last is not the least of the three. The virgin birth is a mere trifle for God; that God should become human is a greater miracle; but most amazing of all is that this maiden should credit the announcement that she, rather than some other virgin, had been chosen to be the mother of God. Had she not believed, she could not

have conceived. She held fast to the word of the angel because she had become a new creature. Even so must we be transformed and renewed in heart from day to day. This is for us the hardest point, not so much to believe that he is the son of the virgin and of God, as to believe that Son of God is ours. God feeds the whole world through a Baby nursing at Mary's breast. This must be our daily exercise: to be transformed into Christ, being nourished by this food. - Martin Luther [Martin Luther, The Martin Luther Christmas Book, trans. Roland H.
